## A Year in Review

When we started planning our philanthropic efforts last year, we never could have imagined that in a few short months a virus would throw the world into turmoil, changing the ways we live, love, and work on a fundamental level.

But if 2020 taught us anything, it's that we're resilient—capable of innovation far beyond what we believed possible. Although last year wasn't the year anyone expected or hoped for, our amazing grantees rose to the challenge, providing oral health services, education, and programming in new and exciting ways.

And while it wasn't always easy, they made it work. We made it work.

The Delta Dental Foundation (DDF) invested more than **\$1.2 million** in COVID-19 emergency assistance, helping safetynet dental organizations, school-based health centers, food banks, homeless shelters, hospitals and other community organizations access necessary resources to keep their staff and clients safe. The DDF also leaned hard into health equity initiatives, funding research, clinics and programs that ensure the people who face the greatest disparities can achieve their full potential through optimal oral and overall health.

This report is a snapshot of the people and projects we've funded over the past year. Many of these projects manifested in different forms, adapting—often with our help—to match the evolving needs of our grantees' communities and the pandemic as it unfolded.

Without the financial support of Delta Dental of Michigan, Ohio, and Indiana, our work would not be possible. We also want to acknowledge the outstanding efforts of the DDF's board, which helped us respond quickly and extend our reach during a year like no other.

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

## **Oral Health By the Numbers**

In 2020, we invested **nearly \$6 million** across **271 grants**, impacting nearly **800,000 lives**.





In 2020, **71 organizations** received a total of **\$171,000** through the Community Mini-grants Program.



## **COVID-19 Response**

When the pandemic began, the DDF knew it needed to meet the changing needs of the people and organizations it supports. That's why the DDF committed more than **\$1 million** to organizations in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana that were working hard to serve their communities during the pandemic. Each recipient received a supply of toothbrushes and oral health educational resources to help locate providers who were open for dental emergencies.

As the pandemic strained so many organizations this past year, the DDF and its partners found creative ways to meet the needs of systemically disadvantaged people and communities. McMillen Health (McMillen), Impression 5 Science Center, and the Girl Scouts are just a few of our partners who adapted to the "new normal" by going virtual, opening up to new ideas, and changing longstanding plans to promote and improve oral and overall health.





## "I Need My Teeth" Oral Health Assembly

McMillen moved their "I Need My Teeth" school assembly to a live virtual format offered to schools in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana. Children up to fifth grade have continued to learn about the importance of their teeth and how to care for them through music. drama and interaction with characters from the "I Need My Teeth" book. In addition, all of McMillen's children's oral health books have been adapted to a digital format and made accessible to everyone. Forty-five performances were presented to schools, which reached 4,874 students and 301 teachers. For the first time ever, the assembly also reached more than 100 parents, giving McMillen the opportunity to better evaluate behavior change from the assembly.

#### Impression 5 Science Center STEM Kits

Every other month, Impression 5 Science Center creates, assembles, and distributes **1,600 STEM education** 

kits to Head Start children three to five years old in the Lansing area. The DDF funds this project in conjunction with the Dart Foundation. Each kit has a different theme, including science and oral health, with concepts that incorporate social emotional development, literacy and math. "Through this STEM kit planning process, we were able to add items that utilize a play-based approach, consistent with early childhood education evidence-based practices demonstrating that young children learn best through play," said Dr. Nolana Nobles, director at Capital Area Community Services Head Start.



#### **Smile Squad Patch Program**

In the Smile Squad Patch Program, Girl Scouts review good dental habits, try an oral health experiment, discover how hidden sugars can damage teeth, and learn how proper brushing and daily reading create a healthy body and mind. Since the coronavirus pandemic began, troops have adapted by earning their patches virtually. Last year, **1,441 Girl Scouts** received their Smile Squad patches.

As everyone struggles to live differently through social distancing, programs like Delta Dental Foundation's Smile Squad Patch Program provided materials and guidance for our troop to learn and grow collaboratively.

## Health Equity and Access to Care

Oral health is integral to overall health. Yet those who need dental care the most are often the least likely to receive it due to barriers such as lack of transportation, the inability to take time off from work for an appointment, limited numbers of dental providers in an area, language and cultural barriers, and lack of adequate insurance coverage. Viewing optimal oral health and access to affordable oral health care as a right rather than a privilege can lead to systemic changes that promote health equity. The DDF recognizes the unique needs and barriers faced by underserved populations and strives to support programs that address them.



### **Uplifting the Disabilities Community**

In the U.S., more than **6.5 million individuals** with a physical or intellectual disability are not able to access the dental care they need. The DDF has focused on changing that statistic, providing funding for inclusive health training and continuing education to dental professionals, caregiver education tools and resources, representation and awareness projects, specialized dental clinics at the University of Michigan and the Ohio State University and more.

In 2020, the DDF funded the development of an interactive mobile application that supports oral health care for patients with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). The platform, created in collaboration with Project Accessible Oral Health and autism technology developer InfiniTeach, will address the core deficits associated with ASD, providing social, communication, and behavioral supports for patients and providing access to critical information for caregivers and dentists.

#### Research to Improve LGBTQ+ Oral Health

Recent federal health information has highlighted the health disparities faced by the LGBTQ+ population. The DDF partnered with Corktown Health Center in Detroit, which provides primary and mental health care to a predominately LGBTQ+ patient base. Corktown approached DDF after their patients repeatedly asked for them to provide affirming, nonjudgmental dental care designed for this population. The DDF not only funded all of the equipment for their future dental clinic, the DDF also connected Corktown to a researcher at Indiana University School of Dentistry (IUSD). Together, Corktown and IUSD developed a dentist and patient survey about attitudes and treatment of the LGBTQ+ population, which was subsequently administered in Michigan and Indiana. The goal is to use survey results to develop education for dental professionals and students and reduce barriers to care.

## Helping Improve Dental Care for People Experiencing Homelessness

Poor oral health is especially prevalent among people experiencing homelessness, largely due to barriers in accessing dental care, dental hygiene products, and nutritious foods. In 2020, the DDF helped fund an expansion of Malta Dental and Medical Clinic's dental clinic and move to a handicap-accessible location. Malta predominately serves people experiencing homelessness and veterans who have no access to dental care. Many Malta patients do not have a permanent address and cannot access Medicaid, making the dental services at Malta crucial for their oral health. The DDF also provided funding to equip three dental operatories at the McMicken Integrated Care Clinic, part of the Cincinnati Health Network's Health Care for the Homeless Dental Program. This program uses partner resources and comprehensive, integrated care to help people experiencing homelessness. Approximately 2,000 patients will be served every year.



## Sealants and Community Water Fluoridation

Both sealants and water fluoridation work hand in hand to prevent tooth decayespecially in children. While fluoride in drinking water can help protect the smooth surfaces of teeth. sealants on molars cover the chewing surfaces, keeping out germs and food. In 2020, the DDF provided funding to the Ohio Department of Health for their Fluoridation Assistance Program. which helps provide fluoridated water to more than 32,000 Ohioans. The DDF also provided funding to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services for the SEAL! Michigan and community water fluoridation programs. SEAL! Michigan provides dental sealants and preventive care through school programs to children that may not otherwise have access to dental care.

## **Medical-Dental Integration**

Even though oral and overall health are intrinsically linked, the way we care for our mouths and bodies is not. Medical-dental integration is an approach to care that coordinates dental medicine into primary care and behavioral health to support individual and population health. The goal? A whole-person, patient-centered approach to care—better outcomes, brighter futures.

#### Improving Behavioral Health and Dental Integration with Peer Supports

Multiple studies show that individuals with mental illness have poorer oral health and are less likely to receive dental care than those in the general population. That's why the DDF funded a University of Michigan Peer Oral Health Initiative to help promote oral health and access to dental care among Medicaid-insured Michigan residents with serious psychiatric disabilities.

The program uses Certified Peer Support Specialists, trained individuals who have relevant lived experience related to serious psychiatric diagnoses, to provide outreach, education and support related to oral health and dental care at three pilot sites in Muskegon, Wayne County and Lansing.

#### Helping Take Dental Care on the Road

To better meet the needs of the **nearly 100,000 individuals** in Macomb County without insurance, McLaren Macomb Hospital unveiled an updated version of their Medical Outreach Clinic (MOC). The new 50-foot vehicle includes multiple treatment rooms, a reception and charting area, a restroom, a counseling area, and, for the first time, dental services, thanks to a partnership with the DDF and Baker College.

But the MOC doesn't just provide free care—it's also a first-of-its-kind training facility for McLaren Macomb Family Practice, Wayne State University Pharmacy, and Baker College dental hygiene students. Together, students gain hands-on public health experience and a better understanding of how their disciplines can work together and be informed by one another. Cross-training helps them bridge the gap between oral and overall health, learning how oral health issues can point to deeper medical issues, such as heart disease and adverse pregnancy outcomes.



#### **Connecting Pregnant People to Dental Care**

Dental care is a critical component of good health during—and after—pregnancy. But for many, dental care can be inaccessible or unaffordable. To help bridge the gap between prenatal care and good oral health, the DDF helped fund the multi-agency Michigan Initiative for Maternal and Infant Oral Health (MMIOH).

The MMIOH program embeds a dental hygienist, with their own dental room, in a community health center. When pregnant people come in for their prenatal care, they also visit the dental hygienist, who is working out of the same area. It's bringing dental care to the patient rather than trying to get the patient to the dental provider.

Although program data is still being evaluated, initial results demonstrate a correlation between receiving prenatal care at a MMIOH site and seeking prenatal and infant dental care. "Getting those silos broken down between disciplines in medicine and dentistry has a huge impact. The [MMIOH program] is pretty simple and straightforward to replicate. It leads young people to a dental home, and that may lead them to an oral health disease-free life."
